<p>Prevention Research Center National Community Committee Retreat Update (Ila & Susan Kunz)</p> <p>Our CAB Liaison is Maia Ingram</p>	<p>Ila and Susan gave an update on the National Community Committee Retreat which took place in Boston, MA. There are 33 PRCs around the country with wide range of representatives including the Native American and Asian populations. For example, Pennsylvania looks at aging. Some CABs work through religious/faith community. Topics include smoking cessation, working with youth on variety of health issues including reproductive health and physical activity, obesity, diabetes, lifestyle was very common, and behavioral health. Very few others use promotoras.</p> <p>The Boston PRC has 3 different partners the University – Community and the healthcare industry (Blue Cross, Delta Dental, etc.) – The health industry is funding community their intervention. Very powerful group.</p> <p>NCC is charged with advising the CDC on prevention research. Can be very influential for future funding. At the retreat there was lots of discussion on effectiveness of NCC, individual CAB discussions. Lots of different levels of participation of CABs on different PRCs, some CABs meet only once a year some meet quarterly. There were discussions around transparency about the budget and mechanics of different CABs.</p> <p>Ila is on the NCC Content Committee.
